The Dutch "donderbuse" or "thunder gun"==Trabuco in Spanish—had a short, flared muzzle to make it easier to load, particularly while on the move or while on a lurching, pitching and rolling coach, wagon, ship's deck, or while mounted on horseback. Such firearms were widely used in Spanish American frontiers, as well as in Iberia. They were very popular in the late 18th century into the first decades of the 19th century for use by travellers on primitive roads, by coachmen as an anti-highway robber gun, by inn-keepers, aboard ship by boarding parties, and by pirates and privateers too. People on the road or at sea preferred the brass barrel for its rust-free qualities as pictured here. The U.S. Federal arsenal at Harpers Ferry produced a version too. The Lewis and Clark expedition even brought some with them on the Corps of Discovery expedition. The flared muzzle was certainly intimidating, but it does not appear to have functioned quite like a "scatter choke" on a more modern shotgun. Instead, the feature appeared to be merely an addition to make it more "fumble proof" while being loaded.
