Today, as of this writing, is International Women's Day, and February was Black History Month, and in a few weeks 21 March 2020 we'll be having our first Civil War skirmish event... So, fortuitously the Smithsonian Institute digitized a few million images, including this one of Harriet Tubman (aka, Araminta "Minty" Ross, 1822-1913) who embodies all three, seen here with her Hawken rifle and a tarred haversack in front of an army camp when she served as a spy. She suffered a traumatic head injury when she was struck in the head with a heavy piece of metal that an angry slaveholder had intended for another slave. The head injury induced visions, premonitions she ascribed to God, dizziness, frequent pain, and hypersomnia, but also left her without fear. Escaping in 1849 to Philadelphia a few years after slavery ended in 1847 (although SCOTUS case Prigg v. Pennsylvania in 1842 held that while federal law is superior to state law, states did not have to use their resources to enforce federal law), she acquired a revolver and began to guide fugitives out of slavery as "Moses" on the underground railroad. During the Civil War she was a scout and spy. She was also an early advocate of women being able to vote, or women's suffrage.

Here is a reward notice from when she first ran away, absconding from Dorchester, Maryland:

THERE ENVIOLENCE DOLLARS

ANAWAY from the subscriber on Monday the 17th ult., three negroes, named as fol-(lows: HARRY, aged about 19 years, las on one side of his neck a wen, just under the ear, he is of a dark chestnut color, about 5 feet 8 or 9 inches hight; BEN, aged aged a. bout 25 years, is very quick to speak when spoken to, he is of a chestnut color, about six feet high; MINTY, aged about 27 years, is of 2 a chestnut culor, fine looking, and about 50.18 feet high. One hundred dollars rewardwill be given for each of the above named negroes, if taken out of the State, and \$50 each if taken in the State. They must be lodged in Baltimore, Easton or Cambridge Jail, in Mary-

Range News:

Please be advised that the monthly first-Sunday Alamo Muzzle Loading Gun Club shoot on Sunday 5 April is going to be the 40-round club *silhouette shoot* and that we are also going to be shooting off cross-sticks! So bring plenty of powder and bullets and cross-sticks! If you were hoping to do some shooting that day with modern center-fire firearms, the silhouette match is blocked out to last from 9am to 4pm, although at 100 yards and up there should be lanes available. Work Party: Saturday 18 April-- Call Gary Quandt for a better idea of what kinds of tools and equipment for specific jobs are needed! Here is what was accomplished in January, and what needs to be done in addition to the light construction jobs our Range Officer envisions:

Jan. 11 work party:

<u>Eight</u> club members turned out. We had to prioritize the work to for the available hands, so divided in two:

Four of us (Ian Straus, David Doss, David Carlson, John Burke Jr.) put up "no trespassing" signs. More need to go up! In addition, we'll need to drive in some T-bars for signage, and apply purple paint to various trees along our perimeter to indicate where our property line is. We may have to string wire fencing here and there if there are conspicuous gaps.

Another four (Bill Knipscher, John Burke Sr., Jarrett Krieger, Rich Beardsley) moved the old shower so as to repurpose it for storage, in accord with the plan to change the range house to provide more meeting room as described at the general membership meeting.

The old shower has been moved next to the range house and had the plumbing removed. It will take more workdays to repair the floor, seal the eaves, and remodel it for storage. We are thankful to Jarrett for bringing his truck with a boom, which made it much easier to move the portable building.



The fence line group picked up some fallen trees off of the fence on the east, south, and west sides and pulled up fence wire and secured it to handy post and trees; stretched one strand of new wire on the west side behind the firing line; and hung "no trespassing" signs on all four sides of the range. This included restoring the wire and sign where the bulldozer came in for our most recent berm work.







Some more fence and sign work remains to be done in future work parties: Stapling wire to fence posts (we had no staples), putting in some steel fence posts (Some are in the ground but we need to get some), cutting brush to get to the fence line in many places, stretching more wire near the SE corner and on the south and west sides, and putting up more signs and cutting brush so signs will be seen. Most of this should be done before the hot weather comes back and the leaves grow. It's easier to do without pushing through mesquite thorns, and easier to cut limbs than move or remove whole trees, so we will need to bring *chain saws, tree pruning shears, and machetes* to do a good job.

T-posts! A post driver!

We've got to repair the shed, expand the club house to provide new room, etc. The gate is starting to scrape, so that will have to be leveled, and we've got to make sure that there is enough space so that a trailer can be brought into the range, which might entail moving the gate some.

Anyone with a <u>bulldozer?</u> We will have to reinforce the long-range berm/ bullet stop at the long range firing line, and we should bring some dirt where it is needed.

GATE ACCESS CODE—By now, actually, in mid-February, we turned off the old gate access code, in favor of the new personalized gate code on your membership card. There were a handful of glitches, where digits were transposed or something like that, but for the most part it has gone relatively smoothly. If you encounter a problem, please be sure to contact Gary Quandt by phone. We have had a few people try to contact the club's Board of Directors via the "Contact" form on the amlg.com website where the message has gotten ensnared in the "Spam" filter—not the eatin' kind either! In such cases, the message was ultimately found, but we'll try to ensure that all of the addresses we've got are not effected. That said, we've had some issues that we are trying to rectify.

SPONSORS for MEMBERSHIP: Remember that in order to join the Alamo Muzzle Loading Gun Club, you do not have to be a muzzle loader. Those of us who do muzzle loading hope to introduce newcomers to the sports, and we do remain a club that prioritizes the muzzle loading and black powder shooting sports, but we are not an exclusive organization. While newcomers don't have to shoot muzzle loaders, they do have to have sponsorship. To clarify: Every member needs a sponsor. Every member in good standing, who has been a member for a year, can sponsor three new members a year. If you do not know anyone in the AMLGC, consider coming down to the first-Sunday shoot, wait until there is a pause, and ask about joining. Members are approachable, and amenable to sponsoring new members.

Long term readers of the *Smoke Signal* newsletter will recall that we looked at using a boarding and fire axe as the "stock" and fitting a flint "lock" and barrel to it in the Swedish navy in the Baltic during the age of fighting sail and rowed warships. This

elicited the 1837 U.S. Navy Elgin cutlass pistol, a .54 caliber smoothbore pistol with a knuckle guard and 11-in. clip pointed Bowie knife blade. Well, along the same design of a bladed weapon or tool with a firearm added, there was the 1846 Postførerverge of the Norwegian postal service. This was an enormous hunting dagger or short sword with two firearm barrels on either side of the blade. Apparently delivering the mail in Norway between 1846 and 1854 was mighty dangerous, and rather than carry irritant spray like our USPS mail carriers for use against vicious dogs, there was a perceived need for a big knife and at least two loaded cap-lock pistols... Trolls? Must be... By 1864, a version was adopted as the m/1864 Carl Gustaf Granberg prison guard combination weapon for use by Swedish prison guards, which is pictured above. Delivering the mail in Norway, guarding prisoners in Sweden apparently necessitated the same design of a really, really big knife and two .40 caliber single-shot pistols!


Break camp and clean up the site before heading home.
